LET'S TALK ABOUT YOUR EGO

Everyone's heard the word "ego" before in some way. But the true meaning and purpose of the ego are much different. We'll examine the ego in psychology and self-because let's face it-everyone has an ego.

The term "ego" comes from the Latin word for "I," and was first introduced and used in psychology by Sigmund Freud. One of the most prominent in psychology, the neurologist proposed a theory that described the ego's role as the part of the personality that judges between the primitive, unconscious personality (referred to as "id"), and the societal or ethical standards (referred to as the "superego"). The Austrian neurologist never directly called it the "ego," instead choosing to refer to it as das Ich ("the I"). Simply put, the ego is the conscious, decisionmaking part of yourself that you regard as "I." The ego involves processes or reactions involving "I, me, or, mine." The ego affects people's thoughts, motives, emotions, and behaviors. However, this does not happen all the time. There can be situations where peoples' "I" is less involved in their decision-making process. For example, when reading a book, working on an engaging task, or in a flow experience, the "I" becomes less prominent.



We commonly use terms like "egocentric, or egotistical" to describe people who are overly selfcentered or selfish. However, the true definitions of these terms aren't quite as harsh. Egocentrism is simply perceiving the world and interpreting events from one's vantage point; we all do that whether we want to or not. Even when being empathetic, we can still never separate ourselves from the way we see and experience the world. To be egotistical has a lesser misconception, as it can mean to see oneself in a better light than should be warranted for a situation. But everyone does that, too. Thousands of studies show that people are biased and often see themselves more positively. One of the broadest terms possible is "egoic," as it simply pertains to "I." There is no negative or positive connotation. The terms egoic and egotistical are unrelated as an egotistical person can be egoic, but so can someone who is highly self-critical.

LET'S TALK ABOUT YOUR EGO

Interestingly, the ego is believed to play a role in certain mental health disorders including OCD, narcissistic personality disorder, and borderline personality disorder. The ego can shape our selfidentity and self-worth, of which both influence our interactions and behaviors with others. Childhood is an important time for the growth of many processes, including the development of the ego. A developed ego will learn to incorporate demands from the outside world and control internal impulses.

An overdeveloped ego can sometimes lead to Narcissistic Personality Disorder; commonly characterized as an inflated sense of self-importance, excessive need for attention, and a lack of empathy. Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (OCD), Borderline Personality Disorder, and Paranoid Personality Disorder, however, are affected by an underdeveloped ego. OCD can often cause the ego to be attached to certain impulsive behaviors to maintain control or stability. A borderline personality disorder may be affected by an underdeveloped ego through a struggle to control emotions or thoughts, as well as forming safe relationships with others. Those with paranoid personality disorder often have a weak ego that is poorly differentiated from the unconscious, leading to a heightened perception of threats. None of these disorders can be diagnosed simply based on the state of one's ego and must be diagnosed by a medical professional. Other popular theories include those presented by famous psychologist Carl Jung and developmental psychologist Erik Erikson.

Carl Jung's theory of psyche and self-identity reflected his beliefs of a collective unconscious, where all humans have universal experiences and archetypes. Additionally, Jung believed that the ego was a component of the human psyche, among the collective unconscious, personal unconscious, and the self. Jung proposed that the ego could be the conscious mind because it's the part that individuals have control over and are aware of.

Meanwhile, Erik Erikson's theory of psychosocial development believes that the ego grows through eight stages, each of which could be associated with a crisis or challenge in a person's life. In order to move along to the next stage, the ego must have a sense of mastery or resolution within each stage so it can move on to the next. Erikson believes that the ego's development continues throughout one's life, with each stage building on the previous. The ego is seen as a tool for self-expression, self-discovery, and fulfilling one's potential. Humanistic psychology, a modern subdivision of the age-old field, which emphasizes individual experience, selfawareness, and self-actualization to understand the human ego.

In closing, the human ego is a completely natural part of one's personality and psyche. It affects us from our childhood on, providing us a way to balance our internal and external pressures. And although society often misunderstands the word, having an ego isn't being selfish; it's human.

column into a book.






