I am thankful for the collaboration and partnerships we have developed throughout the years to support the growth of our students both physically and emotionally. District Update

The 2019-20 school year is off to a great start. We have many academic accomplishments and achievements we are proud of. The high school and middle school have inducted 33 members into the National Honor Society and 35 members into the National Junior Honor Society respectively. This is an incredible feat and certainly is recognition of the work ethic and motivation of our students and the support and guidance from our staff and families. At HPE and GWF our students are becoming authors and publishing pieces of writing that are meaningful to them. Our staff celebrate this great work and encourage our students each and every day to become better writers.

In addition, we had a very successful fall athletic season. The commitment of our athletes and the support of our coaches and families provided the perfect environment for our Golden Knights to excel during the season and represent Holland Patent during the postseason. I cannot thank you enough for the enthusiasm our fans showed throughout the entire season.

Capital Improvements

We are near the completion of our SMART Schools Bond initiative which has provided us with upgrades to our wired/wireless network and security throughout the District with additional cameras and building security enhancements. The \$9.839 Capital Improvement Project planning is progressing and we are on target to begin the site work this spring. We will also be completing some flooring replacements at the middle school and window replacements at the high school. The first full season of competitions at our athletic facility at the high school was very successful. Thank you to our community for your support and your attendance at our new facility.

Participation Rates in the NYS Assessments

As you are aware, each spring the grades 3-8 English Language Arts (ELA), Mathematics and Science assessments are administered to students across New York State. The New York State Assessments measure how our schools and District are progressing with the learning standards and the necessary skills to be successful in college and career. The assessments are a federal requirement and a 95 percent participation rate is required for each District. Currently, we are at 62 percent. In order to meet the federal requirement, the New York State Education Department has: decreased the amount of testing (days and questions); eliminated time constraints; increased teacher involvement with reviewing and creating questions and removed all employmentrelated consequences for teachers and principals. The results from the assessments, along with our other District assessments and measures, plays a vital role in evaluating our overall instructional program. As a District, the data helps us assess our instructional program and guide our curriculum, academic interventions and professional development. The increase in participation rates supports our high graduation rates.

As a District we take tremendous pride in the opportunities and experiences we provide students, families and community of Holland Patent. This is made possible due to the trust and confidence we have with each other which makes for a strong partnership. Your dedication and commitment to the District is truly appreciated. Speakers included, Clinical Social Worker Shawn Johnston from the Neighborhood Center, Crisis Counselor Donnette Morgan from MCAT (Mobile Crisis Assessment Team), and MVCC's (Mohawk Valley Community College) Mental Health Practitioner Nicole Ollerenshaw.



The mental health professionals spoke on essential mental health topics including "stressors adolescents face that their parents didn't", "Potential mental health challenges that first year college students face", "what parents should look for" [in relation to mental health issues], "how parents can offer support" and "when parents should look for outside help".

Community members enjoyed the open forum, casual atmosphere and enjoyed relating with others in attendance on the challenges of raising children in the beginning of the 21st century. Holland Patent high school's school counselor, Jason Scialdone, and school social worker, Stephanie Strzepek, where in attendance offering insight and encouraging parents to reach out to school mental health professionals when they have a concern with a youth of their community. Events like this do an incredible service to communities and today's youth as they fight the stigma of mental health challenges and asking for help while shedding light on obstacles the youth fight in today's world.

Bulk shopping = savings

Shopping from bulk bins almost always saves money. Let your child help you fill bags with foods like rice, beans, pasta, and nuts. *Idea*: Tell him how much you need (say, 2 lbs.), then have him estimate that amount and weigh it to check.



Physical activity is good for your youngster's brain. It can improve her

memory, mood, and ability to focus. Help her get at least 60 minutes of exercise each day, keeping in mind that it doesn't have to be all at once. She might walk to school, run around the playground at recess, and play catch with you after school.

Fruit with a message


Send your child off to school or sports practice with a snack that's healthy *and* inspiring. Use a marker or pen to write an encouraging message on a fruit he will peel, like



a clementine or banana. Example: "I hope your day is a-peeling!"

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A healthier winter break

Special occasions can be learning opportunities when it comes to nutrition. Show your youngster that healthy choices are an important—and fun—part of any celebration with this advice.

Eat normally

Make sure your child has a healthy breakfast and lunch rather than "leaving room" for a big meal. She won't be starving by dinnertime, so she'll be less likely to overeat. If you're traveling, help her pack nutritious snacks to eat during the trip.



Look for ways to get more whole grains and vegetables into favorite dishes. Make macaroni and cheese with whole-wheat noodles, and stir in thinly sliced brussels sprouts or cubed sweet potatoes. For stuffing, use whole-grain bread, and add fruits and vegetables (chopped apples, diced onion, spinach).

Fill up on the good stuff

Encourage your youngster to put healthier options like turkey breast and salad greens on her plate first. Then, she could take small portions of richer foods like gravy or creamy casseroles. She'll learn to make good choices—and enjoy treats in moderation.

M-O-V-E your body

Scientist Isaac Newton was right: A body in motion tends to stay in motion! Set your child up for a lifetime of being active with these tips.

Multitask wisely. Your youngster could balance on an exercise ball at homework time. Or while folding laundry, he might shoot balled-up socks into drawers to score "baskets."

Opt for activity. Walk to the store or playground instead of driving. When you do take the car, park as far from the door as possible.

Vary the exercise. If your child plays baseball, he could swim or bike on other days. Or a gymnast might play badminton with friends on weekends.

Enjoy yourself. Your youngster is more likely to stay active if he's having fun. Instead of telling him to "exercise," suggest some "fun" like riding his scooter.

Mary Roliday Decorations Safety Mary

Tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics

Twinkly lights, candles, holiday trees and plants, ornaments and other decorations are an important part of holiday celebrations. Besides being festive and fun, the decorations your family brings out every year can help children feel connected to family traditions. To help make sure your decorations are safe, the American Academy of Pediatrics offers some tips:

Trees

- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. The needles should be hard to pull off, and should not break when you bend them. When you tap the tree on the ground, only a few needles should fall off. Cut a few inches off the bottom of the trunk before putting it in the stand, and be sure to keep the stand filled with water.
- If you have an artificial tree, make sure it's labeled "Fire Resistant."
- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators or portable heaters. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.
- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree.

Lights

- Check all lights before hanging them on a tree or in your home, even if you have just purchased them.
 Make sure all the bulbs work and that there are no frayed wires, broken sockets or loose connections.
- Be cautious about trimmings that may contain lead. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or non-leaded materials. Light strands may contain lead in the bulb sockets and wire coating, sometimes in high amounts. Make sure your lights are out of reach of young children who might try to put lights in their mouths, and wash your hands after handling them.
- Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use. To

hold lights in place, string them through hooks or insulated staples, not nails or tacks. Never pull or tug lights to remove them. Plug all outdoor electric decorations into circuits with ground fault circuit interrupters to avoid potential shocks.

Decorations

- When lighting candles, remove flammable materials from the area, and place the candles where they will not be knocked over. Never leave a burning candle unattended. Do not use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. For more fire safety tips, listen to "Holiday Fire Safety" on HealthyChildren.org.
- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid decorations that are sharp or breakable. Keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children to prevent them from swallowing or inhaling small pieces. Avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a young child to eat them.
- Wear gloves to avoid eye and skin irritation while decorating with spun glass "angel hair." Follow container directions carefully to avoid lung irritation while decorating with artificial snow sprays.
- Remove all wrapping papers, bags, paper, ribbons and bows from tree and fireplace areas after gifts are opened. These items can pose suffocation and choking hazards to a small child, or can cause a fire if near flame.
- Keep potentially poisonous holiday plant decorations, including mistletoe berries, Jerusalem cherry, and holly berry, away from children.

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TINTER WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSINGS

As the weather begins to change, we will be faced with deciding on opening, delaying or closing school due to the weather conditions. We understand the ramifications these decisions have on our families; however, our top priority is the safety of our students.

HOW THE DECISION IS MADE

- Information on road conditions from transportation staff, Town Highway Supervisors and Superintendents, neighboring School Districts and other sources.
- Amount of snow and ice accumulated.
- Whether precipitation is continuing.
- Building conditions (such as whether we have electricity and heat).
- Status of our buses.
- Weather predictions.
- What other districts are doing. We share information with other local districts and check whether they are opening or closing.

WHO MAKES THE DECISION?

The Superintendent is responsible for the final decision, based on the above factors.

HOW IS THE PUBLIC NOTIFIED?

Parents of students attending the District will receive automated phone, email and /or text messages through our School Messenger Automated Notification System. Please be sure all of your contact information is updated. Also, tune to WKTV, WUTR, WFXV, WPNY, WIBX, WSKS, WSKU, WBGK, WBUG, WUTQ, WVTL, WTLB, WSYR, WTLB, WBRV, WLLG, WRUN, WFRG, WODZ, WLZW, WTLB, WOUR, WIXT, WTVH, WSTM and YNN for information on school closings. You can also check our district website at www.hpschools. org for information.

WHEN IS THE DECISION MADE?

When possible, we make the decision by 5:30 a.m. (or earlier) so that we can activate School Messenger, notify radio and TV stations and post the decision on our website.

WILL WE CLOSE SCHOOL IF CONDITIONS WORSEN?

If conditions worsen throughout the day, the District will decide whether to proceed with an Emergency School Closing. Please be sure your family Emergency School Closing Plans are in place and contact information is updated with the District.

WILL SPORTS STILL BE SCHEDULED?

No. Once we close, all afterschool and extra-curricular activities are cancelled.

We encourage our parents to always assess the situation as well and determine if their child should stay home or board the bus. We hope this information assists our families in better understanding all of the factors which go into school closings and know that your child's safety is our number one concern.
