Our Mission

Holland Patent Central School will provide a safe, caring, positive environment where all students can achieve their maximum innate potential and acquire the skills, attitudes and abilities necessary to succeed in an ever changing world.

Dear Holland Patent Central School District Residents,

Over the past several months, the Holland Patent Central School District's Administrative Team and the Board of Education have been collaborating on creating a District spending plan, which offers challenging, innovating and rewarding opportunities for our students. This plan will allow us to provide our students with educational experiences that support student growth and the development of all learners. With this budget, we have a fiscally responsible plan in place that not only meets the needs of our students, but also supports our compassionate, highly dedicated and gifted staff that strive each and every day to provide our students with the means to grow at their own pace and reach their fullest potential.

At our March Board of Education Meeting, the Board approved a proposed 2019-2020 spending plan of \$35,256,643, which represents a 1.96% increase over our 2018-2019 school budget. We were able to keep such a minimal budget increase over last year's budget by working with all departments and school buildings and to carefully review and plan the components of their programs/departments that continue to keep the best interests of our students and the community at the forefront.

The proposed budget for the 2019-2020 school year supports various opportunities happening throughout our District, as described below:

<u>High School</u>

- The high school has created a highly engaging and collaborative learning environment for our teachers and students through the use of technology. Students and staff are engaging in high-quality instruction and accessing content rich resources through the implementation of Google Classroom and the 1:1 Chromebook Initiative.
 - Through our collaborative partnership with BOCES and higher education institutions, the Holland Patent High School is offering our students opportunities to explore career-related options that support their career plans and also provides them a headstart for success upon commencement.

Middle School

- The Middle School supports the foundational skills necessary to help our students prepare for challenging opportunities as they progress through the middle-level curriculum through accelerated language offerings (Spanish, Mandarin Chinese, French), math offerings and also begin their five-year science track with accelerated science.
- The proposed budget will support a full-time social worker to help address the mental health needs of our grades 6-8 adolescent students. With increased social work support, we will be able to implement more resources to meet the needs of our students and make community connections for our families.

General William Floyd and

Holland Patent Elementary

 Through the dedication and hard work of our elementary staff, General William Floyd and Holland Patent Elementary have become the leaders in our region in the implementation of a new reading and writing workshop approach. We have seen our students become more confident authors, as reflected in their work. We have also seen an increase in their reading fluency from previous years.
The proposed budget also supports our students' mental health needs with more social work support focused on our primary level. This support is crucial as we continue to focus and foster our students' social and emotional well-being.

The proposed budget will include a capital outlay project at GWF to replace flooring with funding we receive from the state each year.

District-wide

- The proposed budget supports our robust extra-curricular program that offers our students a wide-range of experiences, ranging from athletics to gaming to the fine arts. We are very proud of the opportunities we have to actively engage our students' interests and enhancing their talents through creative and competitive experiences.
- We will continue to offer our students and staff with a comfortable, safe and nurturing environment to succeed by providing our students safe and reliable transportation to and from school, clean and safe buildings to work in and healthy and delicious meals to provide them the energy to concentrate and learn.
- This budget also supports two full-time Special Patrol Officer positions who are parttime armed, trained and sworn members of the Sheriff's Office that are assigned throughout our District to provide safety and security to students, staff and visitors.

In addition to the state aid we receive to support the operation of our District, we are asking the community to consider a 2% increase in the tax levy, which is under our allowable tax levy limit of 2.43%. The 2% tax levy meets the District requirements to allow homeowners to qualify for the New York state tax relief rebate checks. In addition to the state aid and local share, we also receive additional revenue sources through shared services, operating grants and other miscellaneous sources.

On May 21, 2019, we are also asking the Holland Patent District Community to consider supporting a \$9.839 million proposition for a Capital Improvement Project focused on the enhancement of our District's infrastructure and safety and security measures. This project will

have no marginal increase on the taxpayers as this project will be replacing retiring debt. We will be receiving approximately 83% state aid reimbursement to help minimize the impact on future budgets and our local share.

A few highlights of the project include, but are not limited to:

- Creating secure entries for General William Floyd, Holland Patent Elementary and Middle School
- Door hardware replacement at all buildings for classroom security
- Security camera installations
- Roof, floor and window replacements
- Bathroom renovations for ADA compliance
- Plumbing, water line and drainage upgrades
- Above ground diesel tanks
- Replacement of zone fire alarm systems.

These items were generated from our District Long Range Facilities Plan, which is updated yearly in consultation with our District Architects, Operations and Maintenance Department and District Administration and the Board of Education. The Long Range Facilities Plan represents many years of careful planning to maintain our facilities and provide a safe and secure environment for our students, staff and community.

In addition to voting on this year's budget, we are also asking you to consider several items:

- Board of Education Election (1 Seat available)
- Authorize 3 New School Buses for \$392,800
- Authorize a \$9.839 Million Capital Improvement Project to focus on safety, security and infrastructure

The Holland Patent Central School District has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation for the third consecutive year by The National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) Foundation. The Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievements and commitment to provide music education to all students.

The Holland Patent Central School District is proud to provide students with a Pre-K through 12th

grade music program, which features classroom music, 12 performing ensembles, chamber groups, a Suzuki Violin program, AP Music Theory, and a Tri-M Music Honor Society chapter. Students regularly have the opportunity to perform at the New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) Solo Festivals and Major Organization Evaluations. This year, 35 Holland Patent music students were selected to perform in honor ensembles, including the New York All-State Wind Ensemble. The music department showcases the hard work of district music students in more than 15 school-sponsored concerts per school year.

The Best Communities for Music Education Award recognizes that the Holland Patent Central School District is leading the way with learning opportunities for music students in the community. The music department appreciates the continued support from the administration, faculty, staff, and community to further the continued growth of music making in Holland Patent.

Holland Patent CSD Officially Joins Esports League

Playstations, Xboxes and other gaming consoles are becoming the new sporting equipment for many high schools and colleges around the nation, along with popular games. The popularity of these games and all gaming has increased dramatically over the past several years, making it a new sport. That's right, competitive video gaming is recognized by the Eastern College Athletic Conference as a varsity sport commonly known as esports. And, students in the Holland Patent Central School District now have an opportunity to participate in the High School Esports League.

With the season beginning in March, the Golden Knights currently have 11 students in grades 9-12 registered for the league with another 21 who have expressed interest. All students are welcome to join.

"Esports players at Holland Patent will be competing with other schools in North America," explained Margaret McNamara, who is leading the Holland Patent esports team. "The students are currently working on skill building until the season starts and then we will have playoffs and finals. Eventually we will be streaming our events in the high school gym, much like a basketball tournament."

Students, parents and the school district community will begin to see benefits of an esports team, which include providing students who play video games a platform to compete and make friends; reach students who are not otherwise participating in extracurricular activities; provide incentives to raise academic grades; promote teamwork; increase skills such as problem solving; increase reflexes and hand-eye coordination; prepare for careers that require mastery of digital media and technology; and provide increased interest in STEM related-fields.



"Esports has allowed schools to transform athletic opportunities for students while promoting physical and mental health, as well as increase pathways for college scholarships," said Holland Patent CSD Superintendent Jason Evangelist. "We are excited to see what our students can achieve with this new league and where it will take them in their futures, especially for students who may not be considering higher education."

For Holland Patent students, this new league is more than just playing games.

"Esports means more than gaming to me," said Esports Club President Ryan McGahey, a junior at Holland Patent High School. "This is an opportunity to use skills that previously were not recognized as legitimate. I hope to be part of something revolutionary."

More than 475 of the nation's colleges support esports with nearly 50 schools providing a total of more than \$59 million in scholarships to gamers. Some colleges offer full ride awards for esports games. In New York state, Canisus, Siena, Keuka and Iona are just a few of the colleges who offer esports competitively.

In 2018, the second-most watched sporting event in the United States after the Super Bowl was the League of Legends finals.


Pesticide Notification

What am I voting on?

A budget of \$35,256,643 for the 2019-20 school year, a \$392,800 proposition to purchase school buses, a proposition to authorize a \$9,839,000 capital project, and one candidate for the Board of Education.

When and where is the vote?

Tuesday, May 21, 2019 from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the Holland Patent High School Gym.

Who is eligible to vote?

Anyone who is a U.S. Citizen, 18 years or older, and a resident within the district for a period of 30 days prior to the vote. A resident is not eligible to vote if they are prohibited from voting under the provisions of Section 5-06 of the Education Law
